## A WORD FROM the VOTT

#### Hope in Freemasonry

The second round in the theological and Masonic ladder, and symbolic of a hope in immortality. It is appropriately placed there, for, having attained the first, or faith in God, we are led by a belief in His wisdom and goodness to the hope of immortality. This is but a reasonable expectation; without it, virtue would lose its necessary stimulus and vice its salutary fear; life would be devoid of joy, and the grave but a scene of desolation. The ancients represented Hope by a nymph or maiden holding in her hand a bouquet of opening flowers, indicative of the coming fruit; but in modern and Masonic iconology, the science of Craft illustrations and likenesses, it is represented by a virgin leaning on an anchor, the anchor itself being a symbol of hope.

#### Faith in Freemasonry

In the theological ladder, the explanation of which forms a part of the instruction of the First Degree of Masonry, faith is said to typify the lowest round. Faith, here, is synonymous with confidence or trust, and hence we find merely a repetition of the lesson which had been previously taught that the first, the essential qualification of a candidate for initiation, is that he should trust in God.

In the lecture of the same Degree, it is said that "Faith may be lost in sight; Hope ends in fruition; but Charity extends beyond the grave, through the boundless realms of eternity And this is said, because as faith is "the evidence of things not seen," when we see we no longer believe by faith but through demonstration; and as hope lives only in the expectation of possession, it ceases to exist when the object once hoped for is at length enjoyed, but charity, exercised on earth in acts of mutual kindness and forbearance, is still found in the world to come, in the sublime form of mercy from God to his erring creatures.

#### Charity in Freemasonry

The apostle in comparing it with faith and hope calls it the greatest of the three, and hence in Masonry, it is made the topmost round of its mystic ladder. We must not fall into the too common error that charity is only that sentiment of commiseration which leads us to assist the poor with pecuniary donations. Its Masonic, as well as its Christian application, is nobler and more extensive. Love a word denoting that kindly state of mind which renders a person full of goodwill and affectionate regard toward others. John Wesley expressed his regret that the Greek had not been correctly translated as love instead of charity, so that the apostolic triad of virtues would have been, not "faith, hope, and charity," but "Faith, Hope and Love." Then would we have understood the comparison made by St. Paul, when he said,

"Though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not love, it profited me nothing."

Guided by this sentiment, the true Mason will "suffer long and be kind." He will be slow to anger and easy to forgive. He will stay his falling brother by gentle admonition and warn him with kindness of approaching danger. He will not open his ear to his slanderers and will close his lips against all reproach. His faults and his follies will be locked in his breast, and the prayer for mercy will ascend to Jehovah for his brother's sins. Nor will these sentiments of benevolence be confined to those who are bound to him by ties of kindred or worldly friendship alone, but, extending them throughout the globe, he will love and cherish all who sit beneath the broad canopy of our universal Lodge. For it is the boast of our Institution, that a Mason, destitute and worthy, may find in every clime a brother, and in every land a home.

#### **City History**

#### Lose Yourself in a Masterpiece

Baltimore is home to three outstanding art museums: the Baltimore Museum of Art, the Walters Art Museum, and the American Visionary Art Museum. The Walters, housed in three buildings along Mount Vernon Place, is noted for its collections of ancient artifacts, medieval armor, and Asian art. The Baltimore Museum of Art, Maryland's largest art museum, is best known for the Cone Sisters' important collection of early 20th-century artwork. It also contains collections of American decorative arts, including 18th-century furniture from Baltimore, and African, American, and Oceanic native artwork. The American Visionary Art Museum is just steps from the Inner Harbor and focuses on the works of intuitive, untrained artists, both local and international.

#### Transport Yourself... Literally!

Take a sentimental journey to the golden age of railroading at the <u>B&O Railroad Museum</u>. With one of the world's oldest and most comprehensive collections of railroad history, visitors can see, touch, hear and explore the magic of the rails. Visitors can see how Baltimoreans used to get around at the <u>Baltimore Streetcar Museum</u>. Open on weekends, the museum operates several streetcars and is dedicated to preserving Baltimore's public transportation history. Those desiring a more fluid experience can explore the <u>Historic Ships in Baltimore</u>, a collection of significant vessels spanning centuries of seafaring. Climb aboard the USS *Constellation*, the U.S. Navy's last sail-powered vessel. Dive into history on the USS *Torsk* (a World War Ilera submarine), the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter *Taney*, and the lightship *Chesapeake*.

#### Live It Up (Historically)

The city has several fascinating house museums that show how Baltimoreans lived in previous generations. The Mount Clare Museum House is a grand mansion built in 1760 and once the center of a bustling 800-acre farm and industrial complex. There are no horrors, just fascinating history, at the Edgar Allan Poe House and Museum. Poe lived in the house from 1833 to 1835 with his aunt, grandmother and two cousins. Not far from the Poe House is the Irish Railroad Workers Museum, a series of modest alley houses where workers from the B&O Railroad lived. The humble rowhouse where Babe Ruth was born is now a museum dedicated to the Sultan of Swat and baseball in Baltimore.

#### Immerse Yourself in African American Culture

The <u>Reginald F. Lewis Museum of African American History and Culture</u>, which opened in 2005, features permanent and special exhibitions on the traditions, culture, and experiences of African Americans in Maryland and Baltimore. The <u>National Great Blacks in Wax Museum</u> is the nation's only wax museum dedicated to African Americans. Exhibits with life-size and life-like wax figures explore the immense diversity of the African American experience, from the horrors of captivity to the fight for liberty and civil rights.

Request a meeting with the **Worthy Patron** of her chapter. If the issue is not resolved to the member's satisfaction, she should:

Request a meeting with the **Grand Worthy Matron**. If the issue is not resolved to the member's satisfaction, she should:

Request a meeting with the **<u>Right Worthy Grand Patron</u>**. If the issue is not resolved to the member's satisfaction, she should:

Request a meeting with the **<u>Deputy Grand Master</u>**, if the issue is not resolved to the member's satisfaction, she should:

Request a meeting with the **Grand Master** 

When the meeting is scheduled, the Member, the Most Worshipful Grand Master and any one else as directed by the Grand Master will attend

The final decision will be made by the Most Worshipful Grand Master and the issue will be considered resolved.

## The Vanessa Ajayí Annual Safety Award

The UMMC-Midtown Patient Safety Program is an ongoing program to proactively identify and mitigate risks to patient safety and reduce medical errors. The goal of the organization is to become a High Reliability Organization (HRO) and to achieve zero preventable patient harm. As a learning organization, MMC-Midtown is moving along the path to becoming an HRO by encouraging collective mindfulness, situational awareness, and promoting a non-punitive approach to reporting events. In addition, UMMC-Midtown is fostering the HRO reinforcing cycle of trust in leadership, a strong safety culture, and robust process improvement.

To reach the overarching goal of Zero Harm, we must continue to work towards establishing a Culture of Safety.

#### This includes:

- Acknowledgment of the high-risk nature of an organization's activities and the determination to achieve consistently safe operations
- Creating a blame-free environment where individuals are able to report errors or near misses without fear of reprimand or punishment
- Encouraging collaboration across ranks and disciplines to seek solutions to patient safety problems
- Commitment of organizational resources to address safety concerns

The Vanessa Ajayi Annual Safety Award recognizes individuals or groups who work towards zero harm) and embody a culture of safety.

#### Criteria:

The award presented annually to staff members or a department, whose actions clearly affect patient safety, embody a culture of safety and demonstrate Vanessa Ajayi's passion and commitment to patient safety in caring for patients. Frequency:

Annually, presented during Patient Safety Awareness Week (typically in March) Time Period:

#### Winners chosen from the previous calendar year Eligibility:

- All Great Catches from UMMSafe
- Any "Speaking up for Safety" stories
- Nominations (for staff not covered by above options)

#### **Time Frame:**

- December/January: call for nominations based on criteria set above
- January: all submissions reviewed by the weekly UMMSafe committee (CMO, DONs, Dir of Quality/Safety/PI, Dir of Regulatory, Risk mgr., PSO, PSC); 5 are chosen (all nominations are forwarded if less than 5 submissions)
- February: The five nominees sent to executive leadership, Directors and Vanessa Ajayi.

Nominee with the most votes wins.

March: certificate, plaque, safety pin presented during Patient Safety Week.

Winner posted on the Insider, announced at Leadership meeting, and placed on Quality page on Intranet.
